



## Our Organizational Structure at a Glance




## How We Help

A victim is any person who is directly or indirectly affected by a crime or tragic circumstance. The organization offers a range of early intervention supports to help individuals, families and groups cope in the aftermath of a traumatic event. These services include crisis intervention, needs assessment, practical assistance, referrals, safety planning, and follow-up.

In addition to our crisis response service, we deliver the Victim Quick Response Program to support victims of violent crimes, and the Victim Quick Response Program to help victims of human trafficking.

Barrie and Area VCARS provides immediate direct service delivery 24/7, in English, French or a range of other languages, to support victims in crisis due to physical assault, domestic violence, homicide, child abuse, sexual assault, human trafficking, hate crime, sudden death, and many more crime types and tragic situations.



## Victim Quick Response Program (VQRP)

#### **Eligible Crime Types:**

Attempt to commit murder
Child abuse
Criminal harassment
Domestic violence
Hate crimes
Homicide
Serious Assault

#### Financial Assistance available:

Safety expenses
Travel and related Expenses
Practical Assistance Expenses

The Victim Quick Response Program (VQRP) offers assistance in the immediate aftermath of a violent crime to victims who require emergency financial help that cannot be obtained through other sources.

Funding for the program is provided by the Government of Ontario.

All clients receive safety planning.

Clients who were unsuccessful in receiving benefits received referrals to alternate services.

The timeline for submission of the application is discussed with clients at the first meeting. It is not unusual for staff to try to re-connect with clients to encourage them to proceed with the process of applying, but without success.

If a client is not able to be reached before the timeline expires, the file is closed.

Sometimes the difficulty relates to clients not returning phone calls, or telephone numbers out of service. Priorities may have changed for the client. Sometimes, while adjusting to life without the offender, and perhaps now solely responsible to single parenting one or more children, clients are overwhelmed with other struggles including having to move, getting a job, and making decisions alone. Others may not have the confidence or belief they are worthy of help so they give up the process.


## Victim Quick Response Program -Human Trafficking (VQRP-HT)

The Victim Quick Response Program provides financial assistance for eligible victims of human trafficking as well as for related witnesses and family members.

The needs of victims of human trafficking are complicated and multi-dimensional. The Ontario government is committed to providing services to support individuals who have been exploited, abused and unsafe due to human trafficking.

The VQRP-HT program offers assistance to help cover emergency financial expenses for practical and personal needs, and expenses related to safety, travel, crime scene restoration, counselling, and residential treatment.
