As we reach the 30th year of service to our community, I am pleased to present this year's Annual Report. I confirm that Victim Services of Simcoe County (VSSC) delivered uninterrupted victim assistance, 24/7 throughout 2024-2025.

Over the years, we have learned from the experiences of victims and survivors that the impact of trauma from crime or tragedy can last for a long time, and even a lifetime. We have met individuals confronted by significant loss and life-changing events on the day they describe as the worst day of their lives. Sometimes there are no words that can comfort or help when a life has been unexpectedly and irrevocably altered, but being fully present matters, and it is what we do best.

To our staff and volunteers who are present, listening, using a trauma-informed approach to understand and support, and identify options, Thank You! Whether you know it or not, you make an immense impact, and I am so proud to work with each of you now and as we move into our next year of service to others.

During the lockdowns of COVID-19, our volunteer program changed in ways we could not have imagined. Our clients preferred remote support either virtually, by phone, or email. Our volunteer numbers dropped which required staff to take on a larger role that would normally have been fulfilled by nearly 100+ volunteers. Over the past year we have noted a shift in requests back to in person assistance. As such, VSSC is going to focus its 30th year on re-building our volunteer program.

As times and needs evolve, we listen to our clients and our community partners to identify ways to improve and enhance processes to ensure we are meeting the victim's needs. Further in this report, you will read about ongoing grant projects. The project goals are focused on enhancing service delivery. Thank you to our supportive government funders and all community partners who help us meet our goals.

I want to thank our wonderful Board of Directors, both outgoing and incoming members. Our outgoing Board Chair Henry Geoffroy was successful in supporting the Board to fulfill their role as a governance body. You are valued and appreciated.

Did you know that all of our front-line volunteers are unpaid community members from across our catchment area who care about the well-being of their communities? Volunteers with Victim Services of Simcoe County are integral to the success of our agency in meeting its mission. Our volunteers donate their time, skills and energy to help make life a little better for those struggling with significant trauma.

All volunteers with the agency maintain their accountability and readiness to provide early intervention services through 36 hours per month on call, a monthly volunteer meeting, ongoing professional development, and a minimum of one year of service. Our volunteers provide support in person and through remote contact.

In May 2025, the annual Victim Service/OPP Victims and Survivors of Crime Week ceremony was held in Orillia. This year we celebrated two volunteers and one of our police partners for their unwavering commitment to assisting victims and survivors of crime. Congratulations to Rita, Kevin, and South Simcoe Police Service.







Snapshot of Our Services





Victim Quick Response Program+

VQRP+ - Victims of Violent Crimes and Human Trafficking

The VQRP+ program supports direct victims, immediate family members and witnesses in the aftermath of a violent crime or human trafficking. VQRP+ provides short-term funding to assist with essential expenses to lessen the impact of the crime, enhance safety, and meet immediate practical needs arising from the crime. In 2024-2025 the agency assisted clients to apply for VQRP+ support in the amount of \$421,474.79.




Canada-Ontario Grant on Minority Language Services 2023-2028

Victim Support Grant 2024-2025


